Brief History of Wikis

- 1995 developed by Ward Cunningham, a software engineer, and posted on the Web
- 2002 "Wiki Farms" developed and wikis become more common



Purpose of a Wiki

- Wikis are used as a:
 - composition site
 - resource site
 - discussion forum
 - repository of information
 - mail system
 - tool for collaboration
 - And much more.



Definition of a Wiki!

Wikipedia defines a wiki as:

"A wiki is a page or collection of web pages designed to enable anyone who accesses it to contribute or modify content, using a simplified markup language (WYSIWYG). Wikis are often used to create collaborative websites and to power community websites. The collaborative encyclopedia Wikipedia is one of the best-known wikis. Wikis are used in business to provide intranets and knowledge management systems."



More Wiki Definitions

- "Wiki" is the Hawaiian word for "quick" or "fast"
- Wiki Page = one wiki web page
- Wiki = a collection of wiki pages connected by hyperlinks



Public vs Private Wikis

- Public vs. Private:
 - -Public wikis are free and, in general, anyone can contribute or edit material
 - Private wikis are limited so that only "invited persons" can contribute and edit material



Categories of Wikis

- There are three general categories of wikis, whether public or private:
 - Content Wikis
 - Process Wikis
 - Community Wikis

- Front Page
- Editing (WYSIWYG)
- Settings
- Adding pages and links
- Uploading documents
- Page History
- Setting Preferences



Building a Wiki: Adding Content

- Build content
 - Determine the organization for the content
 - Add pages and links for:
 - topics or
 - projects

How To Build a Wiki: Security

- Vandalism:
 - Public wikis are subject to tampering and vandalism
 - Monitoring of email updates is necessary to ensure people are not leaving inappropriate messages
- Editing visitors subscribe to wiki in order to make edits



How To Build a Wiki: Invite Users

- Invite users
- Levels of Participation:
 - Readers
 - Writers
 - Editors
 - Administrators



How To Build a Wiki: The Launch

- Develop a marketing plan
 - Determine the best time for launch
 - Place news articles online and in publications
 - Advise interested communities regarding the new site



Pros and Cons of Wikis

Pros

- Flexible
- Collaborative
- Centralized
 information

Cons

- Culture change
- Another site to check
- New technology



Lessons Learned

- Allow about a month to build the content
- Need more time on the front end
- Wait to invite users when the site is built
- Participant preferences set
- Provide training for participants for using wiki
- Keep front page clean and clear about the purpose of the wiki
